

Event Highlights to Date - Community Service

The Rotary Year in Fonthill starts off with great fanfare on the very first day of July with four of our major community service events held in the month of July.

July 1 - Pelham's Annual Canada Day Celebration

Lead by Rotarian Lance Wiebe the Organizing Committee's year long planning comes together with huge family fun from 10 in the morning until fireworks complete the night at 11:00 pm. The Club's contribution to this excellent celebration is well recognized in the community. Every year the event gets larger and busier. July 19 - Band Shell Service Club Night

The Club sponsored and presented this evening of great "Elvis" music as part of the Fonthill Bandshell at Peace Park. The Fonthill Rotary Club banner was showcased at the front of the stage. Club members distributed free water (on a very rainy evening) to the very large crowd gathered to enjoy their evening at the Bandshell. The event is the opening event for the four-day Pelham Summerfest celebration.

July 19 to 22 - Second Annual Pelham Summerfest

The success of the original Summerfest in 2011 led to the event becoming an annual and expanded celebration. Fonthill Rotarians worked along side members of three other local service clubs throughout the celebration. Streets were closed to traffic in the downtown of Fonthill for the entire day on Saturday with street vendors and entertainment for all ages. Rotarians volunteered at the beer tent and selling 50/50 raffle tickets. Our portion of the proceeds are still not finalized, however are expected to have increased significantly over last year (more than \$1,500).

July 30 – 21st Annual Golf Tournament – Lookout Point Country Club

Another beautiful weather day treated golfers at one of Niagara's most prestigious and challenging private course for the Club's largest solo fundraising effort. We experienced a healthy increase in attendance with over 100 golfers plus friends and family sitting down to dinner. The tourney raised net earnings of approximately \$5,000. Next year's tourney is booked for July 29, 2013.

After such a busy July we took a breather with regular scheduled club meetings. The August 8th meeting was an evening social event with our spouses where we inducted the new board of directors.

Activities resumed in September with the 4^{th} Annual Pelham Family Fun Run/Walk championed by Rotarians Michael and Jeannette Lewis on September 8^{th} .

Rotary Interact Club – E.L. Crossley Secondary School

On September 12th the Rotary Interact Club of E.L Crossley Secondary School launched its 19th year with meetings for both Senior and Junior groups. Approximately 34 students attended the meetings. The new leaders presented to the Club on Sept. 19th, reporting they have activities planned for every month of the coming year. Events they are participating in include Christmas Cheer, 30 Hour Famine, Canvassing for Diabetes, Canvassing for Heart and Stroke, Food drives, Terry Fox Run, Running events for Cancer research and contributing volunteer hours to Rotary Club events, such as the TV Auction, road cleanup, etc. The arrival of a school Staff Advisor will certainly serve to ensure the growth of this Interact Club. Rotarian Pat Duncan provides her enthusiasm and guidance to the Club members throughout the year.

International Service Committee

Four members of the club attended the recent District 7090 Foundation Grant Management Seminar. The timing of the grant seminar came at a very opportune time as our International Service committee will be undertaking a strategic review of our clubs past international service projects and our capacity to undertake any new projects.

Report from the President

Specifically I committed to:

- Assist the President Elect to prepare for his coming year of leadership to the club,
- Recruit a president designate for the subsequent Rotary year,
- Increase membership by a net of 3 new members,
- Initiate a strategic review of our club's capacity to undertake an International project.
- Ensure our members have fun in this Rotary year.

The enthusiasm and participation of the members of the Fonthill Rotary Club make the President's job far less taxing than it could be. The core group of long serving members are very good at ensuring new members feel welcome and included in the club's projects. Quite simply they put them to work.

As a means of ensuring new members are afforded the opportunities to learn about Rotary and the full scope of Rotary activities, plans are in place to jointly host "fire-side chats" with two of our neighbouring clubs. Our plans are to ensure these events are informative but also social in nature to build relationships.

Sometime ago the Rotary Club of Fonthill sponsored an "EarlyAct" club at the A.K. Wigg elementary school that became dormant. The Chair of our New Generations committee is taking the preliminary steps to re-active this club.

We have enjoyed early success in our efforts to recruit new members; however it is our intention to continue to focus our attention to increasing our membership throughout the year. All club members are encouraged on a regular basis to invite personal and business associates to breakfast and explore potential membership in the club. Due to health issues we have awarded "honorary membership" status to one of our past presidents.

Treasurer's Report to the District Governor

We enter into our 2012/2013 year with accumulated fund balances of approximately \$41,000. Total fund balances represent \$20,000 of cumulative fundraising restricted for our contribution to Pelham Cares, our local food bank.

The remaining surplus represents our operational budget for the year. This approximates about one year of operational funds for the club, based on existing programs and commitments.

Our fundraising budget for the year provides operational funds for next year's board. (2013/2014)

The current year fundraising target is:

Summer golf Tournament (completed) \$6,100 Summerfest Beer Corral estimated 3,000 Joint TV Auction 9,000

Total fundraising budget of \$18,100

The club will meet its target of \$100 per member contribution to the Rotary Foundation estimated at \$2,500.

The club has also designated \$3,000 of the Golf Tournament funds raised as our contribution to the Foundation Polio fund.

Typical controls are in place for a small club. We have a budget and a periodic board review of our financial position and year to date fundraising and expenses. Bank statements are reviewed periodically by the directors.

2 members are involved in bank deposits, 2 directors must authorize all disbursements by co signing cheques

We maintain charitable status and use our ability to issue tax receipts sparingly

Report from Public Relations

This portfolio has been part of my regular volunteer work in the community for a number of years (at least 10), and as such, I have developed a close relationship with the local print media, and a new online presence in town (mypelham.com). For the most part, we have coverage of our events, either through news representatives providing the coverage, or through submissions made by our club.

We have set a goal of receiving local press coverage at a minimum of once a month, whether for special events, new member inductions, or to share information with our community regarding district, national or international initiatives.

Examples of recent coverage include several articles (in different media outlets) of our 21st annual golf tournament, our participation in Canada Day and Pelham Summerfest. We recently had an article on page 3 of the local community newspaper, calling for applicants for the Friendship Exchange program.

Plans for 2012-13 include keeping pace with this goal, and increasing it when possible, through both more coverage in the traditional outlets, and a concerted effort to use new and social media opportunities. We have permission to upload submissions to mypelham.com, which means we control the message, and the webmasters then deliver this message in a newsletter once a week to 2,000+ subscribers via email.

At the beginning of 2012, we started a Facebook page. While it has had a slow start, there are currently 38 "likes" and several people who redistribute the postings to their walls as well; that is the power of social media; the few share with the many, who share with the many more.

I also plan to train/mentor another member of the club, or more than one member, so that we have more involvement from newer members, and so that we have continuity in this portfolio, should I decide to step back from it for a while.

We have also decided to investigate opportunities for mentoring, linked with the local high school, since we already have a strong link through the Interact Club. We will work with guidance services to identify an informal program in which senior students can be matched with our Rotarians for a "job shadow" for a specified amount of time, so that the students may learn hands-on about that profession.

We will continue to hold periodic Who's Who talks in which Rotarians share the ins and outs of their vocation with the members, during the guest speaker slot at regular weekly meeting.

Report from Foundation Committee

The 2012-2013 looks to be an exciting year for the Foundation Committee. With the implementation of the Future Vision approach, club President Bob Eamer, has asked that we assemble a committee to address a number of components of the program. First, we look to clearly understand the requirements and process for Rotary Foundation District Grant and Rotary Foundation Global Grant. This understanding will be shared amongst the committee so that we have a level of redundancy.

Second, we will be proactive in identifying specific programs (international or local) which the club may have an interest in supporting. These programs will be reviewed with the general membership and put into action given a consensus.

Third, we look to successfully execute the District Grant process during the 2012-2013 year. To support this process, we are engineering our Memorandum of Understanding and look to have this submitted by Nov 30th, 2012. In addition to the management of the Future Vision program, the committee will also be tasked with re-educating the club members on the significance/importance of the Foundation.

We look to review the 6 areas of focus that the Foundation has including; Peace & conflict prevention/resolution, Disease prevention and treatment, Water and sanitation, Maternal and child health, Basic education/literacy and Economic/Community development. In addition, we will continue to review the "Every Rotarian Every Year" initiative and encourage the membership to make contributions to the Foundation.



Our Club's History

The Rotary Club of Fonthill was chartered in 1991. It is one of several service groups operating in Pelham. The Club currently has a membership of 21 regular members and two honorary members. Although small in number, the Club has made an impact on the community.

The largest fundraising effort by the Club was the 2005 drive to raise \$100,000 for the provision of new uniforms and instruments for the E. L. Crossley S.S. Marching Band. Other past successes are the construction of the welcome sign for Fonthill and Club participation in the creation of the Steve Bauer Trail, a recreational trail for walking and cycling, which passes through the community and links to Welland. More recently, the Club was involved in securing a Trillium Grant for the sound system for the Fonthill Bandshell. In summer, free music performances of all types are offered on Thursday evenings for the whole community. Rotary also sponsors one of these very successful events. In fact, the Club chose to feature a representation of the bandshell on our new Club banner, created in 2010.

The Club is very proud of the annual Canada Day Rotary Event in the Park which has grown since 2005 to be *the* place to bring young children for fun games, "bouncey castles," and simple crafts, both before and after the Canada Day Parade. Since 2008, the Club has committed to providing funds to seek a permanent home and funding for Pelham Cares, a community service organization that includes a local food bank, transportation to medical appointments and subsidy programs for sports and camps for underprivileged children. Project Pelham Cares was spear-headed by the Rotary Club of Fonthill and quickly drew support from many others in the community. The project is ongoing as the search continues for a suitable home. We continue to support literacy in the community by donation of funds to the local library to be used as best required.
